However, the focus of the project, 8 9 it's 29 wind energy turbines, remains the The increase in the Project's overall 10 same. 11 acreage in the Supplemental Application reflects only the size of the wind overlay 12 13 zones adopted by the Towns of Villenova and Hanover; it is not a result of a change in the 14 acreage to be leased for the project. 15 result of the engineering refinement, the new 16 Project description more precisely describes 17 18 the other details of the Project. Ball Hill Wind Energy, LLC, a limited liability company existing under the laws of the State of New York (the "Company"), presented an application (the "Application") and a supplemental application (the "Supplemental Application") to the Agency, which Application and Supplemental Application requested that the Agency consider undertaking a project (the "Project") consisting of the following: (A)(1) the acquisition of an interest in approximately 9,715 acres of land located in the Towns of Villenova and Hanover, County of Chautauqua, New York (collectively, the "Land"), (2) the acquisition, construction, installation, and equipping on the Land of: (i) approximately 13.0 miles of gravel access roads, (ii) approximately 19.8 miles of underground medium voltage electrical collection lines, (iii) approximately 5.7 miles of overhead 115 kV electric transmission line on monopole transmission poles, (iv) an

electrical collection substation on a site up 1 to 5.0 acres (with up to 1.3 acres of that 2 impacted by construction of Project 3 improvements), (v) an electrical 4 interconnection substation on a site of up to 5 8.57 acres (with up to 4.0 acres of that 6 impacted by construction of Project 7 improvements), (vi) an approximately 5 acre 8 operations and maintenance building site, 9 (vii) an approximately 7,000 square foot 10 11 operations and maintenance building, and (viii) approximately 20 acres of construction 12 13 laydown area on the land (collectively, the "Improvements"), and a system of gravel access 14 roads, parking, landscaping and related 15 improvements to the Land (together with the 16 Improvements, collectively, the "Facility"), 17 and (3) the acquisition and installation 18 therein and thereon of certain furniture, 19 fixtures, machinery and equipment, including 20 approximately 29 wind energy turbines that 21 22 will each be up to 3.45 megawatts (the "Equipment"), all of the foregoing for use by 23

the Company as a wind-powered electric generating facility (collectively, the "Project Facility"); (B) the granting of certain "financial assistance" (within the meaning of Section 854(14) of the Act) with respect to the foregoing, including potential exemptions or partial exemptions from sales and use taxes, mortgage recording taxes and real property taxes (but not including special assessments and ad valorem

levies) (collectively, the "Financial
Assistance"); and (C) the lease of the Project Facility by the Company to the Agency and the sublease of the Project Facility by the Agency to the Company.

Notice of this public hearing was published in the Observer on January 6th, 2017 and mailed to the Chief Executive Officer of each affected tax jurisdiction on January 3, 2017.

The purpose of this hearing is to provide an opportunity for all interested parties to present their views, both orally and in

writing, with respect to financial assistance proposed in the Supplemental Application. I am here on behalf of the Agency, not the Company. As provided by law, I will not be responding to any comments or questions, my role during this hearing will be only to record your comments or questions. I will provide a summary of every comment or question stated here to the Agency's Board of Directors.

Is there anyone wishing to be heard with respect to the project? If so, please identify yourself before making a statement.

And, sir, could I ask you to approach us so that we can record your comment?

MR. ROLL: Sure.

MS. MORABITO: Thank you. I will also use my recorder today. And please identify yourself.

MR. ROLL: My name is Bruce Roll. I'm a resident of the Town of Arkwright and a landowner in the Town of Hanover.

MS. MORABITO: Thank you.

MR. ROLL: I have five letters in 1 opposition of this project and the other two 2 related wind projects I would like to submit 3 4 to the Chautauqua County IDA and if I can have a minute I'll read this one to you. 5 MS. MORABITO: Yes. 6 7 MR. ROLL: I'm opposed to the construction and public funding of the Ball 8 Hill Wind Energy Project in Chautauqua County. 9 I believe that proposing a project of this 10 size, scope, and negative impact shows a total 11 disregard for this area, the environment, 12 wildlife habitat, bird habitat, and the health 13 of the residents in Chautauqua County. 14 This is a naturally beautiful, naturally 15 clean, naturally healthy, and naturally safe 16 17 place to live. 18 MS. MORABITO: Can I interrupt you for a second? I don't think my recorder is 19 20 recording. I apologize. 21 (Discussion held off the record) 22

MS. MORABITO: Continue from where we stopped. Okay. I apologize. Please continue.

MR. ROLL: This is a naturally beautiful, naturally clean, naturally healthy, and naturally safe place to live. A project of this magnitude (with massive towers and propellor blades) would destroy all of that. It would turn this area into an industrial site that would be neurologically toxic to the residents and all living things due to the distortion and disruption of the natural elements, the wind, light, and sound.

Constructing massive towers with propellor blades at a height of 1600 feet on the escarpment would be like draining Chautauqua Lake. There won't be anything left that makes this area what it is.

There is a natural balance in this area that is environmentally and ecologically beneficial that can't be bought and created by man and will only be destroyed by this project. What hasn't been damaged or

destroyed by agriculture should be preserved and protected.

As residents of Arkwright for 26 years, my wife and I have not received any notification of this project from the company, the Town of Arkwright, Chautauqua County, or New York State. Apparently, the project was started more than a decade ago and the notice from the Army Corps of Engineers was the only notice we received.

It's my understanding that the Chautauqua
County IDA schedules and conducts public
forums without the public in attendance. It's
my understanding that the IDA schedules and
conducts public forums consisting primarily of
paid supporters of the project.

A Town of Arkwright employee informed me there was a public forum in November 2015 to discuss the Arkwright project with no one in attendance. We were not aware of the meeting.

At recent meetings of the Hanover Town
Board and Villenova Town Board, company
representatives were present to explain the

Ball Hill Wind Project. It was with great concern and very troubling to hear that the presenters denied, dismissed, and minimized town residents' questions and concerns about the negative environmental impacts and health hazards to humans that would be created by the project.

It is unfortunate that county residents have not been informed of this project or being misinformed by representatives of the company.

It appears the only thing "green" about this project are the public funds used to artificially support it and the money paid to a small number of supporters (leased landowners) to create a no-win situation for the rest of us and destroy the place we live in.

And then a few other points and concerns my wife and I had. Again, the destruction of the environment, destruction of the natural living habitat, destruction of wildlife habit, disruption of bird habitats, bird flyways and

migratory routes, and bird nesting areas, 1 2 destruction of the beauty of the Eastside 3 Overland Trail and nature trails through state land, negative impacts on the Lake Erie 4 5 watershed, negative impacts on the largest fresh water resource in the world, disruption 6 of the natural elements - the rain, the sun, 7 8 and the wind, negative impacts to the unique 9 ecology, climate, and weather of the region, exacerbation of dramatic weather changes and 10 severe weather, exposure of residents and 11 living things to turbine noise, vibrations, 12 and light shadow flicker, exposure to EMFs, 13 loss of communications - emergency, weather 14 15 alerts, weather radar, TV, radio, and CB, destruction of our quality of life, property 16 17 devaluation, loss of our lifetime investment in our home and our property, destruction of a 18 beautiful, peaceful, quiet, tranquil, healthy 19 20 safe place to live. 21 MS. MORABITO: Do you have other

MS. MORABITO: Do you have other comments?

MR. ROLL: I can. I can go on. A

"windmill". Multiple industrial turbine towers in a series together in an area do not constitute a "farm". Windmill and wind farm are terms used by this electric generation industry to industrialize green spaces and to destroy areas of the natural environment.

Whether the turbine towers are placed on the lake shores of Lackawanna or litter the landscape and countryside east of Arcade, they are an abomination and in stark contrast, incompatible with the natural ecology of those areas.

A single tree has more environmental and ecological value than 100 turbine towers.

Driving through those areas in proximity
to the massive towers actually looks like a
"War of the Worlds" scenario. Man vs. Nature,
and nature loses. Turbine towers are
monuments to man's greed, ignorance, and
destruction of the environment.

The towns of Arkwright, Charlotte, Cherry Creek are a very beautiful, peaceful, rural

1 residential, nature area, historically agricultural and currently evolving into an 2 3 area of farm -- modern farming and recreation, 4 tourism. 5 On a daily basis people are coming to Lake Erie waterfront, Chautaugua County to view the 6 7 They are not coming to view the 600 eagles. 8 man-made junk towering 500 feet above the 9 treeline of the Lake Erie escarpment in 10 Chautauqua County. 11 When you industrialize Chautauqua County, 12 you destroy the beauty of Chautauqua County 13 and we all lose. I'd like to submit five letters. 14 I'm not 15 going to read them all. 16 MS. MORABITO: Okay. 17 MR. ROLL: To the IDA from me and my 18 wife. MS. MORABITO: And the letters are all 19 from you and your wife? 20 21 MR. ROLL: Yes. 22 MS. MORABITO: Okay. Thank you. 23 They're not signed, but MR. ROLL:

they're ones with our additional concerns.

The last two are from my wife.

MS. MORABITO: Okay. Thank you.

MR. ROLL: And just as we see now, a public forum with one person. The initial forum that I went to in the Town of Pomfret, it was -- it seemed to be all local officials and attorneys or ex, former county public -- what would you call it -- town board members and then at other meetings if there's a dozen people that seems to be the total public forum that's involved. And I think there's a problem with this and that because there's thousands of people that are going to be impacted by this and they don't have a voice and a lot of people aren't aware of this.



To the CCIDA Board Members,

As a longtime resident and taxpayer residing in Villenova Township, Chautauqua County, this is my written statement pertaining to the CCIDA's January 17, 2017 public hearing on the Ball Hill Wind Project.

I would ask the board members of the CCIDA to either disapprove financial assistance or delay your decision to further approve financial assistance for the Ball Hill Wind Project upon consideration of the following:

- 1. Members of the Villenova Town Board (the local lead agency under the SEQRA process) do not understand the "engineering refinement" changes disclosed in the public hearing statement.
- 2. The changes I read between your Oct. 11, 2016 public hearing notice and the January 17, 2017 notice are: the project area has been expanded from 8,312 to 9,715 acres, an increase of 1,403 acres and the majority of this expansion is not explained. Ball Hill (the company) changes include: increase of 15.4 acres to 19.8 acres for underground electrical collection lines, increase of 3 to 5 acres for an operation and building site, an increase from 3,750 to 7,000 square feet for an operation and maintenance building. Is the DEC and DPS aware of and approve of this expansion? Is there a reason why the company has eliminated Vestas V126 from the turbine description in the January public hearing notice?
- 3. Though Villenova Town Board voted to approve the Bill Hill Wind Project, several members were not aware of **their** copies of the FEIS (Final Environmental Impact Statement) in the town hall and/or had not read them two days prior to voting on this project! At public meetings, the company representatives told me my questions would be answered in the FEIS. I waited nine months to have mine and other residents' questions about project impacts answered. I read the public copy of the FEIS in the town hall for six hours over the two days before the board voted. While there, someone pointed out to me the board members FEIS copies that had been sitting there for weeks. Yet, A Statement of Findings had been prepared. How do you think I felt seeing this? If board members had not read the FEIS, how could they adopt a formal set of findings under the SEQRA process and make an informed decision? I presented a letter with my concerns to the town supervisor prior to the start of the meeting. He did not

address it. Just before voting, a board member asked the lawyer representing the company questions about environmental impacts.

4. On three separate occasions during Villenova town board meetings, one councilman asked that a survey regarding the Ball Hill Wind Project be mailed to <u>all Villenova residents</u>. His multiple requests were ignored by the company. Yet, in the company's Complaint Resolution Plan (Appendix L) for during construction and operation, they state they will <u>undertake a mailing to all residents of the Towns</u> notifying residents where and who they can complain to. There are five pages detailing the complaint process.

Once again, I respectfully ask CCIDA board members to consider my request to deny financial assistance to the Ball Hill Wind Project and support businesses that will bring real and sustaining jobs to our area.

I am opposing the request to allow Ball Hill Wind Energy to proceed WITHOUT, a certificate of Environmental Compatibility and Public Need.

The purposed turbines have gone from 398 feet to 495 feet. To keep it under 500 feet, RES says these turbines will have larger blades, only 79 feet from the ground, and only a 1200 foot setback from our residences'. My name is Jonathan Townsend, and I am writing to voice my strong opposition to the proposed wind energy development at Ball Hill, specifically the recent expansion of the project by more than 1,000 acres. There are undoubtedly many reasons that one might write in to protest this project, so I will focus on an area I am uniquely qualified to comment on - the risks this poses to bats. As someone who has had a lifelong passion for bat conservation, and as a bat biologist, I am opposed to any wind energy development at the scale and intensity that will be found at Ball Hill. My opposition to the project falls largely into two categories, habitat fragmentation and loss, and bat fatalities associated with construction and operation of the facility.

Habitat fragmentation, while admittedly is less of an issue for bats as opposed to birds or other organisms, will still result in a net loss of roosting habitat or direct loss of roosts through clearing of forests to put in access roads or transmission lines. It will also result in bat fatalities, stress on bat populations through construction activities, and a change in the landscape that will have an impact on the bat populations found there. Yes, bats do often forage in open areas in the canopy, and yes this project will create such openings. However, forests in the County are already fragmented, and there are no lack of forest clearings for bats to exploit. There IS a lack of contiguous mature forest for roosting habitat, which is exactly the type of habitat that species such as the northern long eared bat (*Myotis septentrionalis*) utilize. As you may know, the northern long eared bat is a species that was recently listed as "Threatened" by the USFWS, and from bat surveys associated with this project has been deemed likely to be living within the project area. Additionally, bats can travel well over 10 miles in an evening while out foraging, so there is the potential to impact bat populations not surveyed for or quantified in the SDEIS.

Construction activities are part of the process of habitat fragmentation. The Ball Hill SDEIS claims that construction activities "would not be expected to have a significant adverse effect on bat populations because bats are most active at night when construction is not taking place and because they can temporarily relocate". Bats ARE most active at night, but they still need to sleep, which occurs during the time that construction activities are occurring, so this will still have an impact. Bats CAN relocate - but this relocation puts stress on bats that would normally not occur, places them at an elevated risk of predation, and lowers their success in reproduction and foraging, which can potentially impact the entire local population.

Long known for the impact on bird populations, the wind energy industry actually has greater impacts on bats. On average, around 500,000 individual bats are killed each year in the United States as a result of wind turbine operation. Couple this with the losses from White Nose Syndrome (WNS), a disease affecting cave hibernating bat species, and this becomes a very real conservation issue. Nearly 6 million bats have died in the US since WNS was discovered, also in that time an additional 5 million bats may have died from wind energy related fatalities. A recent USGS article examining the impacts of WNS coupled with wind energy related fatalities suggested serious issues in recovery of the species affected by this disease, several of which are in Chautauqua County.

Depending on whether you use the SDEIS estimates of bat fatality regarding individual turbines or based on the overall megawatts of turbine production, mortality rates of up to 1440 - 1630 individuals per survey season (roughly April to November) are possible. Bats reproduce slowly, generally having just one pup per year. When populations become impacted in this way, it becomes harder and harder for these species to replace those lost each year, and still maintain a viable, thriving population. Wind energy disproportionately impacts the migratory "tree" bats, while WNS largely impacts "cave" bats - between both of these major sources of mortality each group has been put under extreme pressure. These are just two sources, among dozens of other issues such as human persecution, environmental toxins (heavy metals, pesticides, herbicides etc), and an unstable, unpredictable climate. Each individual bat is crucial, especially for species such as the northern long eared and little brown bats - who have experienced dramatic declines (90-98%) in NYS resulting from WNS, and who are likely to inhabit or utilize the project area for this wind park. An assessment of future reproduction potential and subpopulations impacts should be included in this project, as should surveys for and protection of bat maternity roosts.

We cannot hope to turn the tide for our local bats if we keep justifying the need for projects such as this based on anthropocentric minded values. While I applaud the desire to move away from fossil fuels, I do not think this is the right direction to take. As a consultant conducting post construction bat and bird fatality studies in WNY it wasn't unusual for me to drive 800 miles in a week to document fatalities, and when factoring in diesel truck operation for clearing, constructing and maintaining these facilities; as well as the removal of trees that store carbon; it becomes clear that the industry overall is anything but fossil fuel free.

Human activities have created immense tracts of developed land - parking lots, roof tops and streets, that we can utilize for less intrusive methods of electricity generation like solar, or smaller scale, more bat friendly, wind energy units. Projects like this one at Ball Hill will take a rural, agricultural, or forested region, and dot it with enormous, intrusive turbines that will irrevocably change the landscape. Bats everywhere are in deep, deep trouble. Not just locally, but worldwide. They are also extremely crucial organisms, and the more biologists study them, the more crucial they appear to be. In this age of spreading mosquito borne pathogens, destructive agricultural pests, or other insect related issues, it makes sense to conserve our bats, not add to their woes. If not for their intrinsic value, let's conserve them based on ecological economics, for bats provide billions of dollars in ecological services that often go unnoticed. I ask that you please consider the impact this project will have on bats - ANY impact is unacceptable when considering the mounting issues they currently face.


